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LV is "Moving Forward"



When the pandemic descended on the United States in the Spring of 2020, it felt like everything we knew and loved came to a halt. Movie theaters shut their doors, as did many restaurants, shops, fitness centers, and churches (to name a few). We were all advised to stay inside our homes, avoid crowds whenever possible, and protect ourselves with masks and face shields if we did venture out in public. It was a fearful time as we dealt with an unknown microscopic foe that was both contagious and deadly.

As the pandemic unfolded, nursing homes and retirement communities were advised by public health officials to isolate our residents... from other residents, from staff whenever possible, and even from their loved ones (who were prohibited from visiting). That kind of behavior was antithetical to everything we believed concerning the value of relationships and regular socialization. The public health calculus at that time was simple, though: staying healthy and safe was of greater value than the potential downsides of isolation (namely depression and loneliness).

It has been two-and-a-half years since the early days of the pandemic. The virus is still with us, but the "math has changed". Science has blessed us with both vaccines and effective treatments, and for the majority of folks, covid-19 is no more dangerous than the seasonal flu. The latest public health bulletins are recognizing the change, and are relaxing many of the precautions we have observed for the last few years. The "cost/benefit" scale has also tilted: the health danger from the virus is now minimal, and is far outweighed by the positive value of having people congregate and socialize. In early October, Londonderry Village recognized this shift, and eliminated our face mask and social distancing requirements for our independent living residents and their activities and events. You can almost feel the palpable joy on the campus as folks return to their prior routines!

After two-plus years in limbo, it is time to "Move Forward".

Day in the Life of a Dietician

Job shadowing is defined as observing a professional to gain a better understanding of the role. It is often used by students and graduates to give them a better idea of what a particular job entails. It may also be used to onboard new employees into an organization or into a new role. Londonderry Village has staff members who work in several different departments and roles throughout the company, but we all work for the same cause. Job shadowing provides a unique opportunity to see how other staff work and what their role involves. Our mission states that Londonderry Village is committed to providing quality housing, healthcare As stated by Connie, "adequate nutrition is so important, as it can affect the whole body." Preventative nutrition involves adopting eating habits that help prevent the risk of diseases. Diet plays a huge role in our elder's development and progress. Shawn has been employed at Londonderry Village for 26 years serving in many different roles, dietary aide, cook, dietary supervisor, and most recently Personal Care/North View Dining Hall Supervisor, for the past four years. Her daily workload is very busy and includes tasks such as printing resident menus, food temperature logs, table name cards and

and supportive services in an attitude of love and servanthood. As **Resident Services** Coordinator, I do my best to comply with our mission by providing supportive services in activities and involvement. When asked if I'd like the chance to see different roles and functions within another department at LV, I welcomed the idea. Knowing how important it is for elders to maintain a nutrient-dense diet to support healthy aging helped make my decision to job shadow our dietary and nutrition team very



nourishment labels. She posts weekly menus throughout the building, enters information into the computer system, updates the Personal Care seating chart, coordinates meals for Independent Living residents who order daily meals, assists with preparing breakfast, cleaning the kitchen and preparing the tables for lunch.

Shawn works closely not only with the dietary team, but also the nutrition department and nursing staff, ensuring that all nutritional needs are being met. When I asked her what she enjoys

easy. I spent a morning with Shawn Daigle, North View Dining Hall Supervisor, and a morning with Connie Finley, diet-tech in our Nutrition office. Connie is a registered Dietetic Technician who has been serving in this position at LV for 22 years. Her goal is to meet basic nutritional needs, which is done through assessments, monitoring weight changes, food and fluid in-takes, supplements, psychological stress, assistive tools, monitoring body mass index and serving on the care plan team. Some additional duties include monitoring portion control, altering menu selections, finding out likes/dislikes and attending care plan meetings with residents and families. most about her job here at LV, she responded, "The dietary staff I work with and the wonderful residents living at Londonderry Village!"

While participating in this job shadow experience, it became evident to me that although we all have different roles here at LV, we are working for the same cause...providing an environment that is best for all our residents and elders. Both Connie and Shawn believe that it's never too late to make improvements to support healthy aging!

For the past few years, he has created train displays that showcased his hand built, wooden and automated platforms which are found under our Christmas trees at the Main lobby, Snell Community Center lobby and inside the Wheaton apartment building. Any resident, visitor or child can turn the train on and watch it circle our beautiful holiday trees. Recently, Ivan added a second train at the Wheaton lobby so there are two different train styles under the tall, festive tree.

Last year, Ivan thought about the elders living in our Green Houses, Leffler Care and Personal Care units. How will they get to experience the excitement of trains moving on the tracks around a Christmas tree? Ivan set out to find a product that was firm yet light enough to create a "traveling train display"! He instantly had an idea and began building. He created a large platform out of a lightweight foam board and placed it on a large card table to bring his idea to life. Ivan mounted a track to the platform which is carried to each health care building. This traveling train display remains in an area for one week before being transported to a new setting for other Elders to enjoy. When the week is over, our porters (who work with our housekeeping team) move the display to the next unit. The train display travels through our nursing care areas during the season.

Ivan hopes that visitors will share memories with their loved ones when they start the engine, hear the whistle, and let the music begin as the wheels move along the track. It is a Christmas tradition that is warming many elders' hearts this joyful season.
