
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Turning the Page A Look at the History of the LV Library

Books have always held a special place in our lives, opening doors to new adventures and helping us remain lifelong learners. At Londonderry Village, this love for books took root nearly 40 years ago, when the very first library was established on campus.

On November 2, 1985, when Londonderry Village was still known as Lebanon Valley Brethren Home, there were 243 residents and an active Auxiliary with over 1,100 members. Recognizing the value books could bring to the community, the Auxiliary purchased 900 hardcover books and 900 paperbacks to begin building a library collection. In those early days, the books were kept in the Snell Community Center's living room, providing a cozy place for residents to relax and enjoy a good read.

Eventually, a dedicated library space was added near the Stoneback Café, and books became a staple in the lives of residents in both Independent Living and Personal Care. Many fondly remember the joy of walking to the library, selecting a story, and settling in for a relaxing afternoon.

Fast forward to 2015, when two new residents, Mary Engelman and Laurie MacAskill, joined the community. Around this time, longtime library volunteers Marge and Harry Markley needed help with the annual inventory. That's when Mary and Laurie stepped in, and they've been a dedicated team ever since. For the past decade, they've led the library's efforts with care, efficiency, and a deep love for reading.

Mary keeps the shelves tidy and well-stocked, while Laurie handles typing, bookkeeping, and presenting updates at Auxiliary meetings. Together, they travel to Joy Book Store a few times a year, hunt down the best deals, and stretch their \$1,000 yearly budget further than you'd think. Thanks to their smart shopping and love for books, the library always has something fresh and exciting to offer, with a fan favorite being popular Christian fiction series. Every month, the newest titles can be found on the shelves near the return box, waiting to be discovered



The Village Boutique

What began as a simple thrift shop in 1978 has grown into one of Londonderry Village's most beloved resident-run amenities, the Village Boutique. Approved at just the third meeting of the Londonderry Village Auxiliary, the original "Thrift Shop" opened its doors in a modest 22x30-foot space with a budget of \$10,000. Dorothy Kline served as the original coordinator, working closely with the ever-dedicated Rhea Rauch to bring the vision to life.

ow, 47 years later, the shop is still going strong, offering residents and staff a place to find gently used clothing at unbeatable bargains. The Boutique's transformation over the years has been remarkable, with fashion shows at our Fall Festivals and a beautifully updated space that brings both charm and functionality to campus.

Doris Curry began her service as coordinator in 1997 and led the Boutique with grace and dedication for two decades. With help from her three daughters in later years, Doris worked alongside Deb Curry and Judy Mongold until her retirement in 2016. After that, leadership passed to a former resident Jo Albright and SallyAnn Arndt, an off-campus volunteer.

In 2019, Beverly Forry stepped into the

leadership role and has continued the tradition with passion and purpose. She now oversees a team of 17 devoted volunteers, each playing an important part in keeping the shop running smoothly. From stain removal, mending, and ironing to pricing, displaying, and banking, there's a task for everyone, and every task is done with care.



The Boutique is not just a shop, it's a community hub. Volunteers often say the best part is the social atmosphere and the joy of helping others. Those who shop describe it as a personal shopping experience, especially when staff find the perfect item for them, often for just \$2 or less during clearance sales.

"IT'S A TREASURE,"

one volunteer shared. "People are always complimenting the finds, and the residents proudly say, 'lt's from the Boutique!'"

Beyond the campus, the Boutique gives back in meaningful ways. Unsold clothing is shared with local charities like Jubilee Ministries, Unto, CommunityAid, Keystone Prison Ministry, and more, extending the Boutique's reach well beyond Londonderry.

As we celebrate 47 years and counting, we are deeply grateful for the tireless dedication of our volunteers and the Boutique's impact across generations. Here's to the next chapter in this stylish, second-chance success story!

From the moment Ivan and his wife Lucy moved to Londonderry Village ten years ago, he began finding ways to give back to the community he now calls home. While Ivan's talents are many, one mission quickly rose to the top: recycling education. With passion and patience, Ivan transformed our campus into a model for environmentally conscious living. His engaging presentations, hands-on demonstrations, and signature catchphrase

have helped hundreds of residents understand and embrace more effective recycling habits.

But Ivan didn't stop there. He personally designed newspaper collection boxes to make bundling and donating easier, coordinated with local farmers and nonprofit organizations, and built a dedicated team to collect and sort recycling from more than 500 Independent Living residents. He even produced an educational video to showcase how individual efforts support this collective mission, ensuring that every recycled item finds its purpose.

Ivan's creativity also shines through his lifelong love of trains. At Christmastime, his handmade train platforms bring joy to residents and visitors alike, from festive lobby displays to the "Traveling Train" he created for residents in healthcare units. His projects reflect not only talent, but deep care for the happiness of others. One display even became permanent in the Leffler Care Center, allowing residents in skilled nursing to enjoy the sights and sounds of the holiday season year after year.

Recognizing the importance of social connection, Ivan also applied his problem-solving mindset to our community BINGO games. Seeing that the small system wasn't keeping up with large crowds, Ivan and fellow resident Larry constructed a custom mobile BINGO setup that could be transported across campus. Their solution added excitement and ease to one of the most beloved weekly traditions, reinforcing how small improvements can have a large impact on communal joy.

In addition to his recycling and recreation efforts, Ivan took on one of the Village's largest volunteer initiatives: the Estate & Barn Sale. When leadership transitioned, Ivan stepped in and grew the event into a major fundraising success. With nearly 300 volunteers participating under his guidance, the sale now generates close to \$100,000 annually to support our benevolent care fund. His strategic planning, teamwork, and commitment to inclusion are at the heart of the event's continued growth and impact.





Heart-Healthy Summertime Recipes



Baked Lemon-Dill

INGREDIENTS

1 tablespoon fresh dill, chopped (or 1 tsp

2 salmon fillets (4-6 oz each)

1 tablespoon olive oil

Salt and pepper, to taste

Optional: 1 garlic clove, minced

1 lemon, sliced

Caprese Skewers with Balsamic Glaze

INGREDIENTS

- 1 pint cherry or grape tomatoes
- 1 container (8 oz) mozzarella balls
- 1 bunch fresh basil leaves
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- Salt and pepper, to taste
- Balsamic glaze
- Toothpicks or small skewers

Heart-Healthy Tip: Use a homemade balsamic reduction with no added sugar and opt for low-moisture part-skim mozzarella.

INSTRUCTIONS

- Prep the Ingredients: Rinse and dry the tomatoes and basil. Drain mozzarella balls and pat dry.
- Assemble the Skewers: On each toothpick or skewer, layer one tomato, one basil leaf (folded if large), and one mozzarella ball. Repeat until all ingredients are used.
- Season Lightly: Drizzle skewers with olive oil and sprinkle with a touch of salt and pepper.
- Add the Glaze: Just before serving, drizzle with balsamic glaze for a sweet and tangy finish.
- Serve Chilled or Room Temp: Perfect as a refreshing starter for any summer gathering!

Heart-Healthy Tip: To reduce sodium, skip the added salt and instead enhance flavor with extra herbs and fresh lemon juice.

INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat Oven to 400°F
- Prepare a baking dish with foil or parchment paper for easy cleanup.
- Place fillets skin-side down in the dish.
- Drizzle with olive oil and rub gently to coat.
- Sprinkle with salt, pepper, and dill. Add garlic if using.
- Top with thin lemon slices.
- Bake for 12–15 minutes, or until salmon flakes easily with a fork.

Heart-Healthy Tip: Using dark chocolate with 70% cacao or higher provides antioxidants and less sugar than milk chocolate.

INSTRUCTIONS

Peel and slice bananas into ½-inch thick rounds. Place on a parchment-lined tray.

- Freeze slices for 20–30 minutes, until slightly firm.
- Melt chocolate chips (with coconut oil, if using) in a microwave-safe bowl in 20-second intervals, stirring in between until smooth.
- Dip each banana slice halfway into the melted chocolate, then place back on the tray.
- Add optional toppings immediately before the chocolate sets.
- Freeze for 1–2 hours until fully firm.
- Store in an airtight container in the freezer for up to one week. Serve straight from the freezer for a sweet, bite-sized treat.

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
